



## MANUAL

Combatsack is an ergonomic 100-liter dry backpack that makes a long journey enjoyable even if it means a heavy rain or direct contact with water.

- Internal storage 100 L, load capacity 40 kg, temporary water tank 40 L
- Height 85-110 cm, width 38 cm
- 500D Tarpaulin

### **INSTRUCTIONS AND MAINTENANCE**

For keeping the backpack compartment airtight and dry please follow the instructions:

1. Ensure that there is no dirt or any particles between the sides of the bag opening
2. Align the sealing strips and fold the closure tightly down 3 times
3. Bring the ends together and buckle securely

For cleaning the backpack use soft cloth with soap and then soak it in clean water. Do not brush or clean with chemicals that may decrease the quality of the material, damage the surface and parts of the product.

### **WARNINGS**

Ensure that you have been properly trained to use the Combatsack backpack or other similar product safely. Do not use this product as a watercraft or a lifesaving appliance. While carrying the backpack never go into water or cross the ice. When using the backpack in water the air can escape from the compartment in various situations. It could be infiltrated by water during incidents of submersion or incidents of high water pressure.

Be careful with the handling of the product on a rough terrain and near sharp objects that may harm the fabric and create holes resulting decrease in its functionalities as a waterproof backpack.

Do not overload the backpack. Heavy pressure and frequent wrapping may damage the fabric of the product and leave marks on the surface paint. Frequent rolling of the closure and tightening of the straps in temperatures below 0 degrees Celcius may harm the fabric of the backpack and weaken the buckles.

Do not expose the product to fire, heat and high heated objects. Keeping the backpack in direct sunlight for a longer period of time may cause the fabric to become softer – for recovering the fabric hold it in the shade for a few minutes and cool it down.

Do not carry any living beings inside the backpack and be aware of the danger of suffocation

If the backpack is used as a water-container be aware that the contained water may not be drinkable.
